Please pray for our nation at this time, and especially for a breakthrough in the pandemic that will allow us to meet together for worship again as soon as possible.

The Story of the Early Church: A Higher Authority

After the Day of Pentecost (Acts 2) the followers of Jesus were boldly proclaiming that Jesus was alive! It seemed that nothing could stop them as they went about preaching and teaching about Jesus the Messiah. A message of triumph, power and hope – who could possibly have difficulty with that!?

But it wasn't long before the early church was subject to great persecution — violence, imprisonment, even death. As the Christians were hunted down and consequently many fleeing Jerusalem for fear of their lives, they could have raised a number of questions: Why is God allowing this? How come the good news is being rejected? Why are we suffering like this? Will the Gospel mission of Jesus be halted and God's plan for the salvation of the world be thwarted?

Despite the oppressive and violent actions of the civil and religious authorities of the day, we see in the book of Acts that the followers of Jesus knew that they were answerable to a Higher Authority – the Almighty God was still in control, and even working all these evils for His good purposes for the spread of the Gospel.

1. Persecuted for doing good in Jesus' Name Read: Acts 3:1–10 & 4:5-16 Peter & John healed a crippled man in the name of Jesus (Ch3). Their good deed and their bold proclamation brought them before the religious leaders who jailed them and then subsequently interrogated them (Ch 4) Unable to refute the obvious – that the man was healed – and seeing the positive response of the crowed, the Jewish leaders commanded Peter & John to no longer speak of Jesus. Peter responded: "Which is right in God's eyes: to listen to you, or to Him? You be the judges! As for us, we cannot help speaking about what we have seen and heard." (Ch 4:19, 20)

2. Confidence in a Higher AuthorityRead: Acts 4:23 - 31
Peter and John return to the gathered believers and tell of their ordeal.
The Church prays! They could have asked God to bring down great punishment upon their enemies. They could have prayed that God would spare them from such danger. They could have complained to God that they shouldn't have to suffer these things. **But no!** They praise God for His sovereign power and glory, and even ask God to help them speak more boldly about Jesus!

3. God's is still in control and the Gospel spreads

Throughout the Book of Acts we see that whenever the Church suffered, the Gospel spread and more people believed. In fact the disciples considered it a blessing to suffer disgrace and violence for the name of Jesus (see Acts 5:42).

The persecution of the Church actually led to the spread of the Gospel and the fulfilment of Jesus' mandate for the disciples to bear witness to Him to the ends of the earth (see Acts 8:1)

Even the Apostle Paul could see the hand of God at work in his own suffering and imprisonment: Read Philippians 2: 12 – 14

Reflection: How might the believers' prayer and Paul's attitude influence the way we respond to opposition, persecution and the challenging times in which we live?
