WHAT IS GOD SAYING TO US THROUGH COVID-19? (LUKE 13:1-9)

(As we have endured a challenging year, we may be wondering where God has been through all of this? What is God trying to teach us/me? Bob Pryor was due to lead us through these questions this Sunday (10/1/21), and I am grateful he has provided us with the following reflection. Ian.)

Pray: Lord, in your sovereign will You work all things together for the good of those who love You. Father, as I read Your Word, open my eyes to the way You are working in these present times. I ask this in Jesus' name. Amen.

Read: Luke 13:1 - 9

Reflect: It is not uncommon in the media to hear the question: what are we learning through the pandemic? At the end of Luke 12 Jesus criticises his hearers for not being able "to interpret this present age". In Chapter 13:1 – 5, He then goes on to discuss two tragedies: one involving a political slaughter and the other a construction accident. In both cases significant numbers of people died.

Note how Jesus considers these events in ways that would astonish most of us:

- He does not try to explain why they occurred
- He does not consider that those who died did not deserve their fate
- He does not insist that those who died were being singled out for special punishment
- He does not consider that somehow God's goodness or control has suddenly come into question and immediately require some sort of justification
- Human evil and natural disasters are viewed as signs that something is drastically wrong with our world and with ourselves.

In effect, Jesus is saying: "See what sin is like, see what it does, look at its consequences and do not think that any of you can escape them. Therefore, repent, turn back, come to me, seek forgiveness and mercy, enter My kingdom."

In verses 6 to 9 Jesus tells a parable of an unfruitful fig tree intended to be uprooted but which is given a reprieve for a further year by the intercession of a man who promises to care for the tree in effort encourage its fruitfulness. In this context, the point being that God's delay of judgement for all of us is also his gracious opportunity for repentance.

SOME COMFORTS & CHALLENGES FOR US IN COVID-19

- Jesus is calling for you in this time of crisis
- God's delay is never the coldness of indifference, but His opportunity to demonstrate grace
- The imminence of judgement is the constant incentive for our witness to God's mercy and forgiveness to those who have not yet turned to Jesus
- Let us make sure we refuse to use "obeying the government" (eg lockdown) as an excuse for not doing anything constructive in the service of God.
- Consider how, despite imposed restrictions, we can selflessly and sacrificially show the love and grace of Jesus to others in these times when they may need them most.
