It started with an application for the extension of placement for our Reverend Ian Weeks. He has been at Belrose Uniting Church for the maximum time of 10 years.


A GIFT

Due to the interruption

of COVID this was extended by 6 months but was due to expire in June 2021.

What followed was an extensive process with the 'Life and Witness Consultation team'.

Then a unanimous vote from our whole congregation occurred at the Extraordinary Congregational meeting on September 13th 2020. A landslide of goodwill announced that we hoped that Reverend Ian Weeks would remain at the helm of Belrose Uniting Church.

With full support, the Church Council applied for Rev Ian's extension to be for the full 5 years, at which time he will be 65 and eligible to retire.

Then there was the vote of confidence from the Sydney Central Coast Presbytery's Pastoral Relations Committee - which came as a surprise to some. They recommended the full five years' extension to Rev Ian's placement. This vote was then put to a full meeting of the Sydney Central Coast Presbytery held on Wednesday 11th November. The vote was affirmative. Reverend Ian Weeks, against the odds, some might say - was granted the maximum extension of 5 years to stay to lead our Church. This was a most unusual decision.

What a gift! Thank you God for answering our prayers. Thank you God for preparing and changing and melting hearts. It is exciting to consider what God's plans might be for the future for Rev Ian and Anne and our Church.

Gayle's Memories

Belrose Uniting Church | Favourite Memories Gayle Dean, Family Worker 2000 - 2008

Thank you to Venessa who asked me to contribute to 'the Seeds of Hope' project. I am honoured to do so. It was difficult to know where to begin, as I looked back on the fulfilling of my life, remembering so many wonderful experiences I had of God's blessing being poured on Belrose Uniting Church.

I began work at this church in 2000, and finished in 2008. Back then, it was a bold move to employ me as a Family Support Worker. The church at the time had a new-but-small 10.30am service, not much available for



young families, and few teenagers. The minister was fairly new too, and there was no Youth Worker yet.

I was convinced that the right person, ready to shape a church life that was attractive and relevant to young families, and to motivate and excite those already in the church, would be used by God to bring in a new season of revival.

So I set to work. My memories are of how easy it was to establish mid-week groups, which slowly filled to capacity. Those groups were so precious and it was a privilege to lead them.

How I loved all those beautiful young mothers who came every week, hungry for support and refreshment, and keen to understand who Jesus is. So many of them made a decision to become a Christian - and then brought their husbands and children along to the Family Service on Sunday's! How I loved seeing so many families grow in their faith, always with the interest and support of the church's faithful older generation.

I will never forget the strong working relationship I enjoyed with Rev Wendell Flentje and Rev Steve Parker, and of course Youth Worker Zoe, as we drew in the pre-teens and ministered to them together. I have believed that our wonderful God blesses a church when the leadership is obedient and keen to submit together to his will. I experienced that blessing and every one of those 8 years was for me, it was joy.
